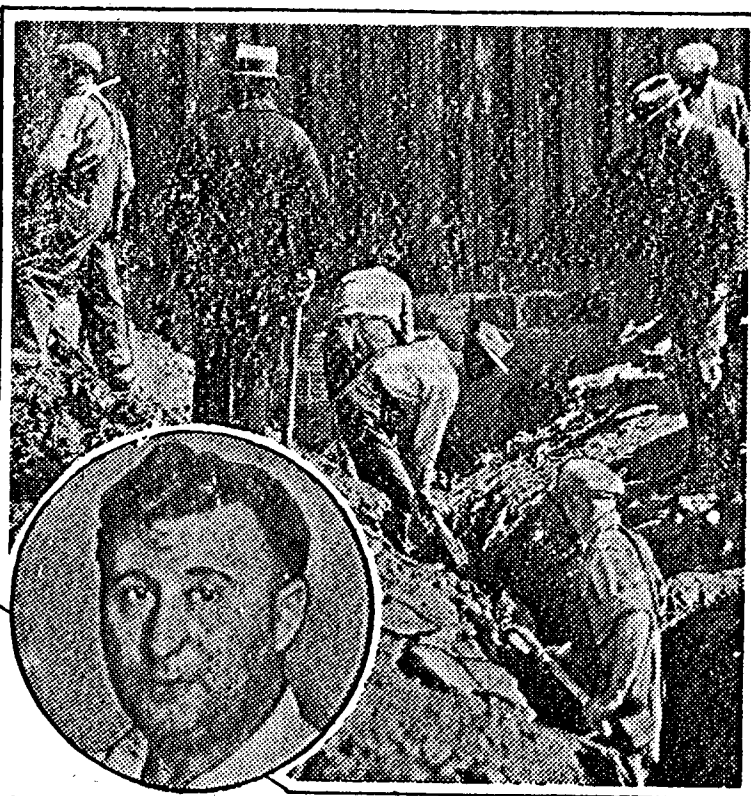

BACK FORTY

Two dozen new agricultural students who entered Ord high school last week were asked what animal husbandry subject they had the most interest in and wanted to study first. They were given dairy and beef cattle to choose from. They could have taken poultry. Sheep were also on the list. They might have selected hogs and a few did indicate a preference for swine. But the interests of the majority were in another topic. They wanted horses. This almost unanimous selection came from a group of farm boys who thrill at the sight of auto races, and unbend to watch an aeroplane pass; who glance at occasional tractors as they drive to school in their autos. It is the first time since the beginning of such instruction that a cross section of farm youth has had a major interest in draft horses. Since most of it had its origin from the conversations of older folks, it signifies an increase in equine interest as long as present economic conditions last. The boys offered nothing original in the course of their arguments. They simply repeated that most farmers keep horses anyway.

that they furnish a market for cheap and unaleable feeds, and that gasoline, oil and power machinery demand a cash outlay which most farmers do not have. The tractor was not without its backer. One lone youngster, whose father farms without horses, came to its defense. He contended that the tractor does not eat in winter, and that it performs tasks more thoroughly, quickly and cheaply than horses.

The students did not think that horses will stage much of a comeback. But they believed that they will hold their own, and stop decreasing in numbers from now on. The boys felt that horses have been neglected to the extent that their generation knows less about spavins than about speedometers, and that they need to enlarge on their supply of horse sense.
