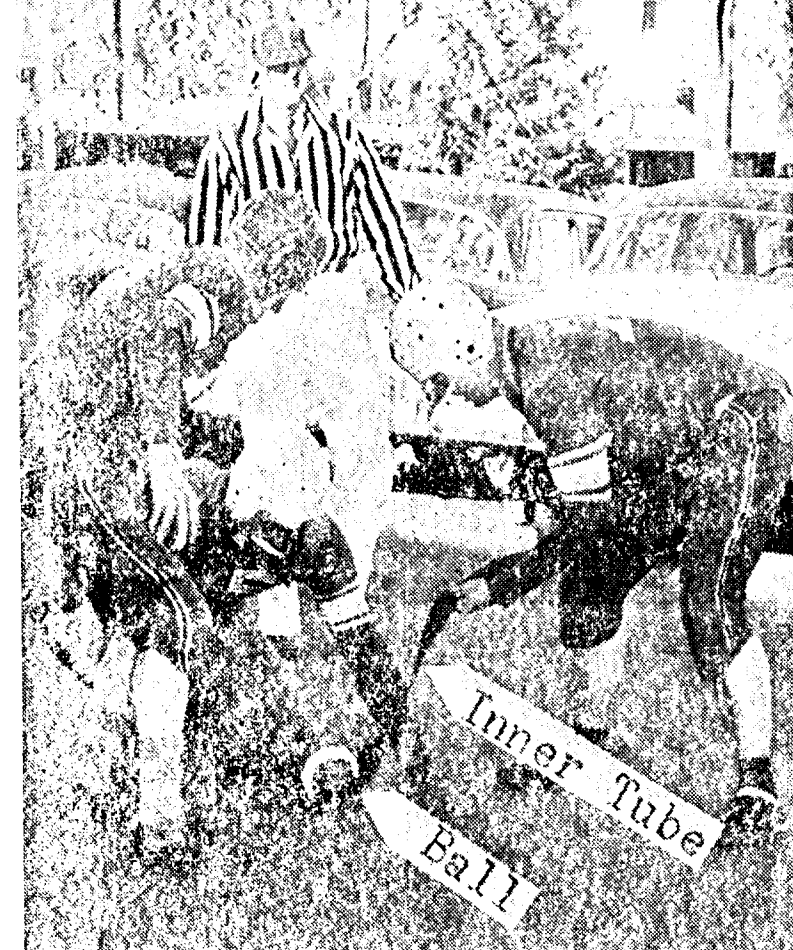
Chant-Aurora Fray Friday Grid Fare

Consumers Power Has A-Plant Hope

Plant Near Lincoln
or Beatrice Might
Attract Big Industry

Top officials are confident location of the atomic-powered generating plant in Nebraska will expand industry in the state.

The Atomic Energy Commission has given Consumers Public Power District, Columbus, the green light for construction of a plant to produce 75,000 kilowatts of power.

Probable location of the plant is between Lincoln and Beatrice, possibly near Hallam.

State officials, especially those from the Nebraska Resources Division, say efforts will begin immediately to attract industry to take advantage of the by-products from operation of the plant.

The division is charged with bringing new industry to Nebraska, its chief C. V. Price, said companies already have expressed great interest in locating near the plant.

Plant is "Great"

Gov. Victor Anderson has said he feels location of the plant in Nebraska "is one of the greatest things that could happen" to the state in an industrial way.

Dr. Emerson Jones, nuclear adviser for Consumers, said industries likely to be attracted by the plant are food processors, drug manufacturers and chemical companies.

Exact cost of the plant has not been fixed, but is estimated at between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000. The amount of money Consumers will have to put into the venture has not been determined.

For Food Processing

Jones speculated that food processing industries would be the most likely ones to use by-products from the plant. Methods have been developed, he said, to sterilize or pasteurize many foods with radiation from the by-products so they can be stored for long periods without refrigeration.

As an example, he said, irrigated potatoes can be stored at 50 degrees for several years and they will not spoil, sprout or taste differently.

Operation-wise, atomic power, instead of coal or natural gas, heats water until it turns to steam. The steam is used to turn turbines to generate electrical power. The main difference is that atoms are used for fuel instead of common fuels.

New Clubs
Two new clubs were organized this past week making a total of 33 clubs in our county council with 400 members.

One of our new clubs is in Hayes Creek northwest of Arcadia. Women call themselves the "Hayes Creek Extension Club." I believe this is the first club ever to be organized there. We certainly are glad to have them with us.

Aid Pork Demand
The newspapers have all been headlining the low price of pork—now is the time to eat it, store it in your freezers or do all you can to increase the demand.

Lean pork is flavorful and nutritious. It supplies the same high quality protein as other meats, iron and other minerals and vitamins. Pork is especially important as a source of thiamine (one of the most important of the B vitamins) both because it contains significant quantities and because there are fewer valuable food sources of this vitamin than of other B vitamins.

For safe eating pork should be cooked well done. Braising rather than broiling is the recommended cooking method for pork chops and steaks. Larger pieces can be roasted but it should be done slowly in low temperature oven.

Apples are good with pork. To pep up unsweetened applesauce add 1/2 cup crushed peppermint stick candy and 1/4 cup sugar for each two cups of applesauce. Heat until candy dissolves, stirring often.

(Continued from Page 1) For it soon developed that Japanese B is transmitted to humans by the bite of a mosquito, Culex tritaeniorhynchus. Only the females are venomous bloodsuckers; the gentle males stick to flower nectar. All well and good, but mosquitoes disappear in winter. Where did they fill up with encephalitis virus in the early summer to pump it into humans? The answer was an animal, no doubt, with seasonal habits— one easily infected with the virus but not made seriously ill or killed by it. That pointed to young animals, which would promptly develop antibodies. The only creatures that fitted these specifications were birds.

Are the ducks still north of us or has the main flight gone through? And if the flight has gone south, will any of the big greenheads find their way back as weather warms?

These were the \$64 questions being pondered by Ord sportsmen Wednesday morn, after watching the mercury dip to -2 Tuesday night.

Some evidence indicated a lot of mallards went through Tuesday afternoon but opinions differ as to whether it was "the big push."

Bob Adamek, with three companions brought in nineteen ducks Tuesday evening.

Don Patrick, one of the party, got a big Canada honker.

Ross Allen and his brother also bagged limits.

But others who shivered in frost-bitten blinds Tuesday saw few ducks and others saw none at all.

From Ed Michalek, at Scottsbluff, came word that 103 ducks had been killed from his blind in the last three days and that Scottsbluff hunters "never had it so good."

From Lexington on west, Platte river duck hunters were bagging limits and the story was much the same from the Missouri river region.

Here the story is different. Apparently the quackers were on the move. But the migrations were merely feeding jaunts up and down the river.

Best bag up to Tuesday was reported by Hank Benda, George Cezka, Richard Masin and Verlin Smith.

The quartet nailed nine Sunday then tabbed five more, Monday.

Ducks On Move

Benda said the duck exodus southward still hasn't started, in his opinion.

"We saw 'em on the move but they were going both ways, up and down. There's been some teal killed which makes me think the big flight south hasn't started," Benda said.

Other nimrods shook and shivered in the weekend's colder temperatures, but few bagged anything sizable.

Burl Miller Calife Herd Decimated by Oat Hay Poisoning

North County Farmer Loses 26 Head Sat.; Vet, Agent Seek Cure

Cattle poisoning ravaged one Valley county farm site this week.

Burl Miller, who farms near the Brick school, lost 26 head of Hereford breeding cattle all settled with calf.

Ord Veterinarian Dr. Dale Karre said the cattle died from oat hay poisoning.

He said the hay had been cut this year. Miller fed a load Saturday morning.

At 5:30 p.m. the cows started drooping. Dr. Karre was summoned. By 8:30 p.m. 26 head were dead.

16 Head Saved

Karre said he treated 42 of the 51 cows. Apparently 16 were saved.

Karre said the cattle died from nitrate poisoning. The oats store up nitrates while growing, he said.

"We treated the cattle with intravenous and oral antitoxins. The blood in the cattle's veins was black. The nitrate ties up the oxygen in the blood supply," Karre explained.

The poisoning almost wiped out the Miller breeding herd. The market value of the cattle was about \$100 a head.

Herd Takes Years

"However," Karre added, "that does not take into consideration the years Miller spent building up, selecting the herd."

Karre said other farms sometimes feed oat hay.

He and County Extension Agent Bob Perry this week were searching for a method to make the hay safe.

"We'll announce it as soon as it is found," Karre promised.

Former County Agent Reports on Scottsbluff

Says Big Problem Is to Stop Water Waste by Farmers

The prime difference between Valley and Scottsbluff counties is that Scottsbluff county raises crops.

That is the opinion of Carl Dale, former Valley county agent, who this spring accepted a new post with the Gering National Bank.

Mr. Dale is the bank's good will expert among farmers. He dispenses advice, points out new developments and in general makes friends.

About Western Nebraska corn Dale says:

"The average farmer who harvested 40 bushels of dry land corn kept still. Fifty bushels was an average. The farmers who bragged raised well over the 50 mark."

Water No Problem

"Water is no problem," says Dale. "We had adequate spring rains. We didn't start irrigating until July 15. Rain is usually above normal."

Dale said irrigated corn went over 100 bushels. The overall county average for 55 dry land and irrigated acres was 70 bushels.

Scottsbluff farming is more intensive, says Dale. "There's a lot more machinery used and a lot of 80 acre farms. Corn is planted in 36 inch rows. Stalks are heavier and much closer than in Valley county. Stalks are every 8 inches. The corn is heavily fertilized."

The main crops are corn, beans, potatoes on irrigated land. There's lots of alfalfa.

Farmer Is Sharp

The Scottsbluff farmer is a sharp operator. His investment in land and machinery is high and he has to make it pay. Any decent irrigated farm sells for \$400 an acre. Most crops are fed to cattle and sheep. The bean crop brings \$9 to 45 bushels per acre. Beans sell for \$6.20 a cwt. or \$3.70 a bushel. Beans are an easy crop. They take little water and little fertilizer."

Hail is the biggest gamble in his area, says Dale. But despite hail some farmers still manage to harvest 80 bushel corn crops.

Dale was in Ord over the weekend on a visit.

Stanton managed to shut the machine off, with his foot when he became entangled.

K-N Control in Hugoton Field Is OK'd by Commission

The Securities Exchange Commission has approved a financial arrangement which gives Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co. ownership of the working interest in the 10,000 acre Hugoton gas field in Kansas.

S. D. Whitman, president of Kansas-Nebraska, said the registration became effective at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 10.

Under the arrangement the Deerfield Gas Production Co., and the Kearney Gas Production Co., Delaware corporations operating the field, in effect sell the working interest to Kansas-Nebraska.

But the Hugoton Trust is being set up, and from it, stockholders of Kansas-Nebraska have the right to purchase trust certificates at \$4 a unit.

Kansas-Nebraska, which has been paying Deerfield and Kearney a well head price of 11 cents per thousand cubic feet for gas produced at the well, under the Kansas minimum price order, will take over operation of the wells and pay the trust 6 cents per thousand cubic feet for distribution to the holders of certificates.

Deerfield and Kearney will discontinue.

No oil has yet been discovered in the Hugoton field but Whitman said the oil rights have been sold to Excelsior Oil Co., which will be a wholly owned subsidiary of Kansas-Nebraska subject to certain overriding royalties that are on the property.

K-N stockholders have 15 days in which to exercise their rights to purchase the Hugoton trust certificates or sell these rights. Any certificates not taken up by stockholders will be offered to employees, Whitman said.

The story was reported in state city dailies, last Saturday.

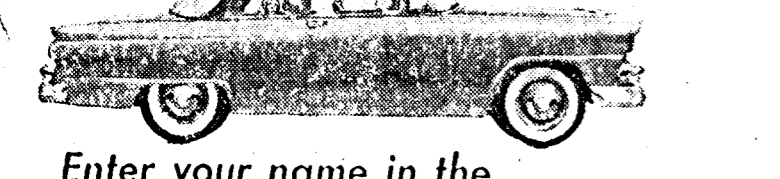

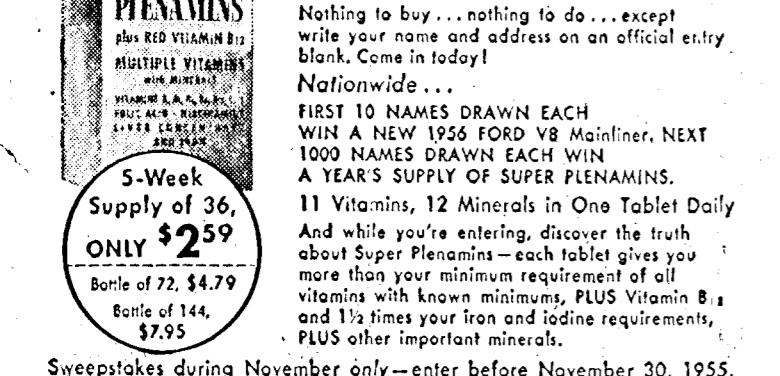

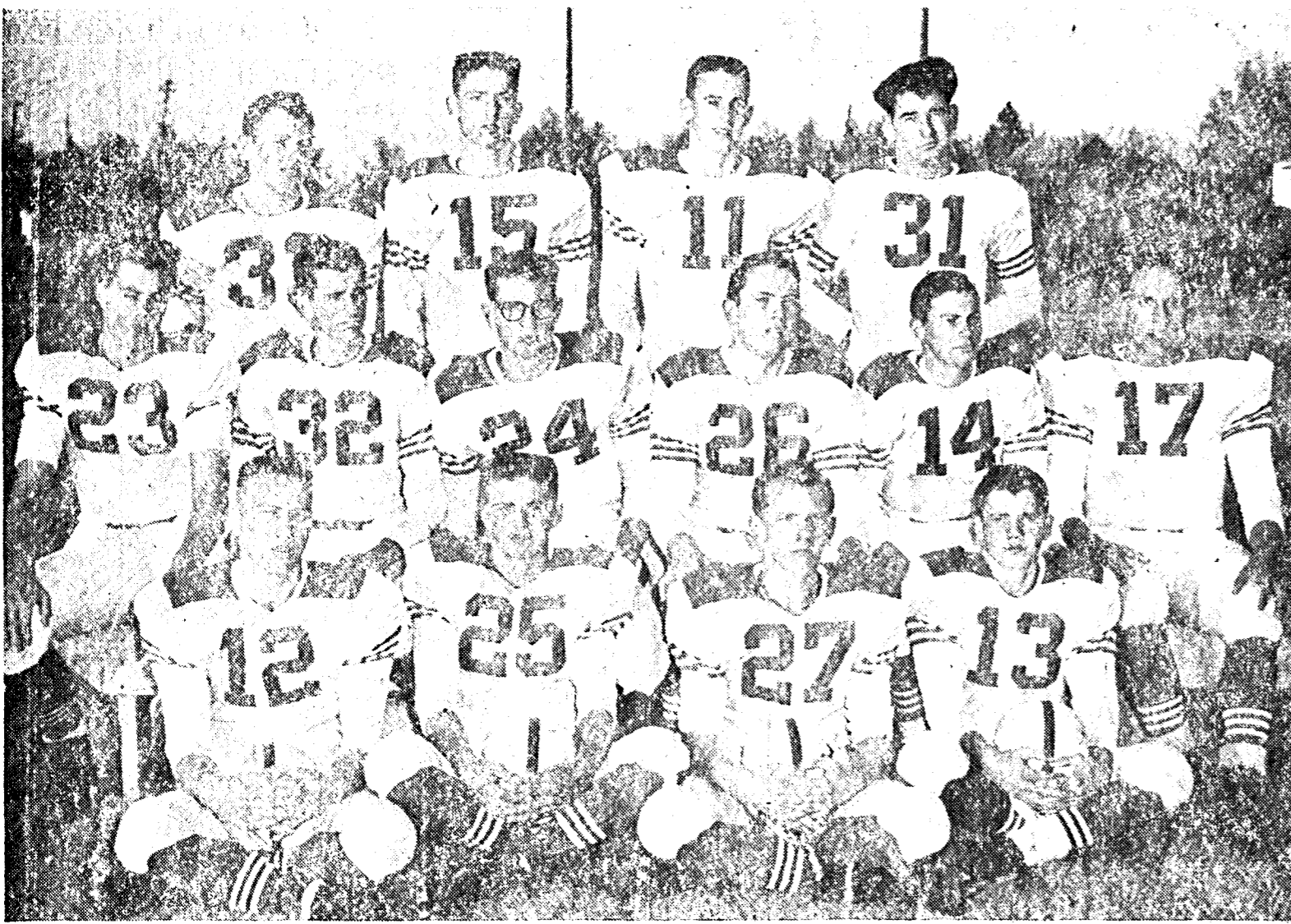

Tabbing Ord for the honor Raglin wrote:

"In Class B, the ratings have undergone a shuffling with Ord holding first and Crete moving into second ahead of Cozad.

"Crete and Ord were to meet for the Central 10 title, but the game was canceled. Crete played five Class A foes without losing. Nebraska City held Crete to a tie while the Cards handled the other four 'A' opponents.

Central 10 'Tough'
"The Central Ten is represented by the most rated teams—Ord, Crete, Central City, Seward, York and Fullerton. It is a solid, tough conference and affords ample action week after week for its members.

Lack of a similar sturdy slate hampered Chadron and Plainview, although both earned Top Ten spots.

Cozad and Minden, especially the former, offered Ord and Crete stiff competition for the state Class B title. Cozad was the only team to defeat Minden.

The tone Cozad loss was dashed out by Class A McCook.

"But Ord had what it took, winning nine in a row with only Central City seriously threatening to beat the leaders.

"Ord was stingy with the points, holding all but one foe to a single score or less. Aurora got a pair of TDs in a 51-13 loss. Meanwhile on offense, Ord was tremendous. Central City was the lone club to hold the Chanticleers to less than a trio of tallies. Ord averaged almost five TDs a game."

Crete Is Central 10 Crown Winner

Ord this week lost the Central 10 conference championship through a move by the league's executive committee.

Apparently Ord school officials were notified of the decision. And it probably came as no surprise. Ord expected to be fabled with a loss of the league title since it refused to play on a date acceptable to Crete.

Here is the way the league move was reported in the Crete News:

"Crete has been declared winner of the Central 10 conference and the playoff game with Ord has been called off.

"The Chanticleers, who won the western division of the conference, indicated to Crete officials that they did not want to play the game.

"After meeting to discuss the situation, the Crete Athletic Board concluded they would abide by the conference constitution and play the game.

"Crete players and coaches wanted to meet Ord.

"This report was relayed back to Ord, after which it was turned over to the executive committee of the Central 10. They in turn voted to award the conference crown to Crete.

"Ord is currently rated first among Class B teams in the state. Crete is fourth.

"Card followers believe Crete's record is more impressive than that of the Chants, even though the Cards fell to David City.

"Ord has played Holdrege, Broken Bow, Loup City, Ravenna, Albion, Fullerton, Central City, Aurora and Gothenburg and is unbeaten.

"The Chants' regular schedule ended last Friday night. To play Crete they would have extended their season two weeks."

Ord C. C. Receives 'Sympathy' Card

Bill Lee, Ord chamber of commerce president, this week received a "note of sympathy" postmarked Crete.

In addition to printed condolences, the ornate bereavement card said:

"Our hearts bleed for you up there in the country where the hoot owls live with the roosters. We got a big bang out of reading about your big chamber of commerce 'booster band.' What's the matter? Are you afraid to play a good team?"

The card was unsigned.

Lee immediately dispatched the following letter to the Crete News, hoping Editor Lloyd Reeves there would publish it.

Mr. Lloyd Reeves, Publisher
Crete News
Crete, Nebraska
Dear Sir:

This week the Ord chamber of commerce received an unsigned Sympathy Card postmarked 'Crete'.

The card, in addition to printed condolences, bore typewritten references concerning breeding habits of fowl indigenous to this area. And then, in conclusion, asked "What's the matter, afraid to play a good team?"

If you will permit the space I would like to reply to this unknown writer. Your newspaper is the sole means I have of reaching him assuming of course he has the ten cent purchase price and can read.

Dear Unknown:
Ordinarily I would consign an unsigned letter to the privy where it would be put to a more practical use than being answered by a busy executive.

However, since the lack of signature may be the outward manifestation of an educational shortage rather than a breach of manners, I will reply by stating a few facts. If you find this impossible to read I'm sure you'll be able to find a Lincolnite on his way through who'll translate.

Fact 1. Football, as it is played in Ord, is a game by and for stu-

dents. I know this view will be astounding in Crete where the average fan has the mentality of a grade schooler but we still leave most of the football decisions up to the boys who play it. In other words football is a sideline. Our prime consideration is education. Therefore when our football boys make a decision favoring education over football we find little reason to get excited. The Ord-Crete game was such a decision.

Fact 2. Aside from the above I fail to see what Ord could accomplish if they sacrificed their attendance at the Hastings clinic to beat one more fourth-rate team. Crete was rated fourth, wasn't it? The Chanticleers have beaten many fourth-rate teams over the last three decades. Not one of these victories, I remember added one more bit of luster to the Class B crown. So why another game just as routine and just as fourth-rate.

Fact 3. You insist Crete is a "good" team. May I ask where you get the basis for your belief? And if the belief is strong enough to convince you why hasn't it convinced three outstanding football sportswriters on Nebraska daily newspapers?

Fact 4. In conclusion I'd suggest some of the form of contest between Crete and Ord rather than football and preferably one that the fans could participate in. We've outranked you in football and bested you in manners. Do you have any other suggestions?

Feeding Corn

We are receiving more of our contract feeding corn this week. Shipments have slowed up quite a bit because the small arrivals at the Omaha market. The cash corn market remains very strong with heavy demands for corn. Good quality corn testing No. 2 or better is the kind of corn that we are getting; with stormy weather near this corn might carry a little moisture later on. It looks to us that at present prices it is well to have a supply of corn on hand.

Protein Feeds

This is getting in to the cattle protein feed season. You should start now to give a little protein to your stock cattle and keep up their present body weight. One pound of good protein feed will make your present hay supply go a long way farther. In buying protein feeds to use with present roughage be sure that you buy a protein feed containing Vitamin A. And under irrigation we are getting reports of a number of large fields that have averaged better than 100 bu. per acre. Not just a little test plot but an entire field.

Extension Notes

Reading Tips

Sweet Spuds Cheap

Sweet potatoes are now in the lower price circle. The crop this year is 21% larger than in 1954 and as a result current prices are about half what they were a year ago.

Sweet potatoes and white potatoes can be used interchangeably as energy providing foods. The greatest difference in food value is the amount of vitamin A each supplies. The white potato supplies none while the sweet potato is one of the richest. One medium sized deep colored sweet potato will contribute two to three times the amount of vitamin A recommended for a day.

Stiff Petticoats

Martha Bohlsen, home service director, after a TV demonstration, received hundreds of favorable comments from viewers who tried her suggestions for stiff petticoats. Some of her listeners used the same method for nylon and cotton net.

Nylon "paper" taffeta petticoats which have lost their original crispness when laundered, may be renewed with glosstex starch. For that "stand alone" crispness that the teenagers want, the petticoat should be completely dry after washing and ironing.

Spread the petticoat flat on a table and rub undiluted glosstex into it with the hands, covering every portion of the garment. It may sound like it takes a lot of glosstex, but it doesn't.

To dry, pin petticoat to two parallel clothes lines, having the crispness not more than 12 inches apart. Make sure the portion of the garment pinned to the line is on the straight of the material. Allow to dry thoroughly. If hung out of doors select a clam (not windy) day. Petticoats starched in this way will "stand alone."

For a little less stiffness, we recommend starching with a 1 to 1 solution of glosstex (1 part glosstex to 1 part water). For this, the garment may be dipped into the solution, rather than rubbing the glosstex in by hand.

To dry, follow same procedure as above.

Rat Drive

By proclamation, the governor of Nebraska has set November 14 to 19, as "Kill Rats and Mice Week."

Rodents cause serious losses economically and are a menace to human health. Restriction on the sale of grains

for human consumption are becoming more stringent. After July 1, 1956 the tolerance for wheat will be one rodent pellet per pint or one per cent insect damage. A few facts about rats:

Rat Count

Harold Gunderson, Iowa State College rat specialist, has worked out a popular plan for estimating farm population.

If rats are never seen but signs are visible, there are from 1 to 100 rats on the farm. If rats are seen occasionally at night, 100-500. If seen every night and occasionally by day 500-1000. If many seen at night and several every day 1000-5000.

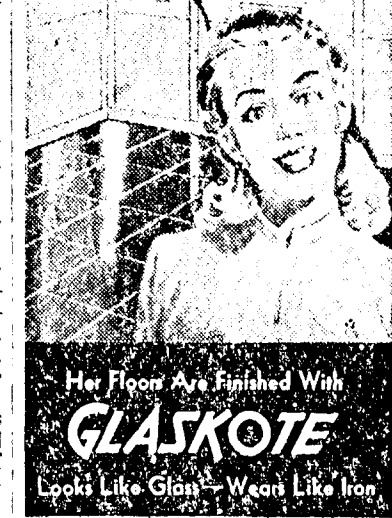
Each rat costs ten dollars plus



Charlene Severns Tells Experiences

Miss Charlene Severns, who lived in Ord at one time, now a student of music in Austria, reports her experience as a Fulbright student. She says she left Hastings on Sept. 11, and traveled with another Fulbright scholar (Carlson) and Holdrege. He was going to Vienna. In New York they stayed in the International house at Columbia university. They bought incidentals of traveling and arranged visas for Austria, then picked up French francs and Austrian schillings. They saw interesting sights and the day ended with a cocktail party for the 45 students going to Austria. The Austrian consulate general was host.

The students sailed on the SS United States. They were given the traditional gift of a hat, a creamer and band music. Charlene says she and the others stayed on deck until the New York skyline and the statue of Liberty were out of sight.

There were four girls in the cabin that Charlene used. The menu offered everything and the service was unusual. She was ill two days.

The group was met at LeHavre by a Fulbright man and were given tickets to Paris. They spent a day and a night in Paris, and had great fun ordering from the French menu. A conducted tour gave the young folks many interesting sights.

She says: "The subway in Paris has New York beat all to pieces. You found the place on the map where you wanted to go, pushed a button and the whole trip would light up. This way you could tell the number of stops and where to get off. I ate lots of steak. It was cheap and very good. Once I learned to cook 'steak' I used it."

"We were in Vienna about ten days at the Hotel Muncherbuhl. The orientation period was under direction of the U. S. Educational Council in Austria. We were entertained by them and by the American Ambassador to Austria. Everything was paid."

"We saw the parade of the first Austrian soldiers after the liberation. I was in the front row by the main gate. I saw the army, the band, and all the high officials of the government. Everyone cheered when their national anthem was played."

"A cocktail party was given to the students by the Austrian Ambassador, very formal and in a beautiful mansion. We were in famous society."

"The Fulbright students are specialists in some fields, doctors from Mayo, forestry, geology, economics, archeology, painting, music, language or history."

"The hotel is cold. I have been to three operas, and have heard the Vienna boys choir, Yvonne Clannella and I rode to Salzburg, in the station wagon owned by a Mayo doctor. She is a New York soprano."

"I am now in Salzburg and have found a room. It is in a new house and I use the kitchen and bath. I pay about \$16 a month. I receive \$145 for living expenses. The room is 20 minutes ride on the bus from school. My landlady can speak English and German. She lives alone and works in a Catholic-American welfare office. I cook with electricity and we have central heating. I have been to school and have auditioned as an organ teacher. I am taking education courses. The teachers are much like the teachers in Hastings college. The teachers are thrilled because I am the first Fulbright scholar to be interested in the teaching methods of Austrian schools. They have offered me private courses if I want them. The standards are high and the professors know their stuff."

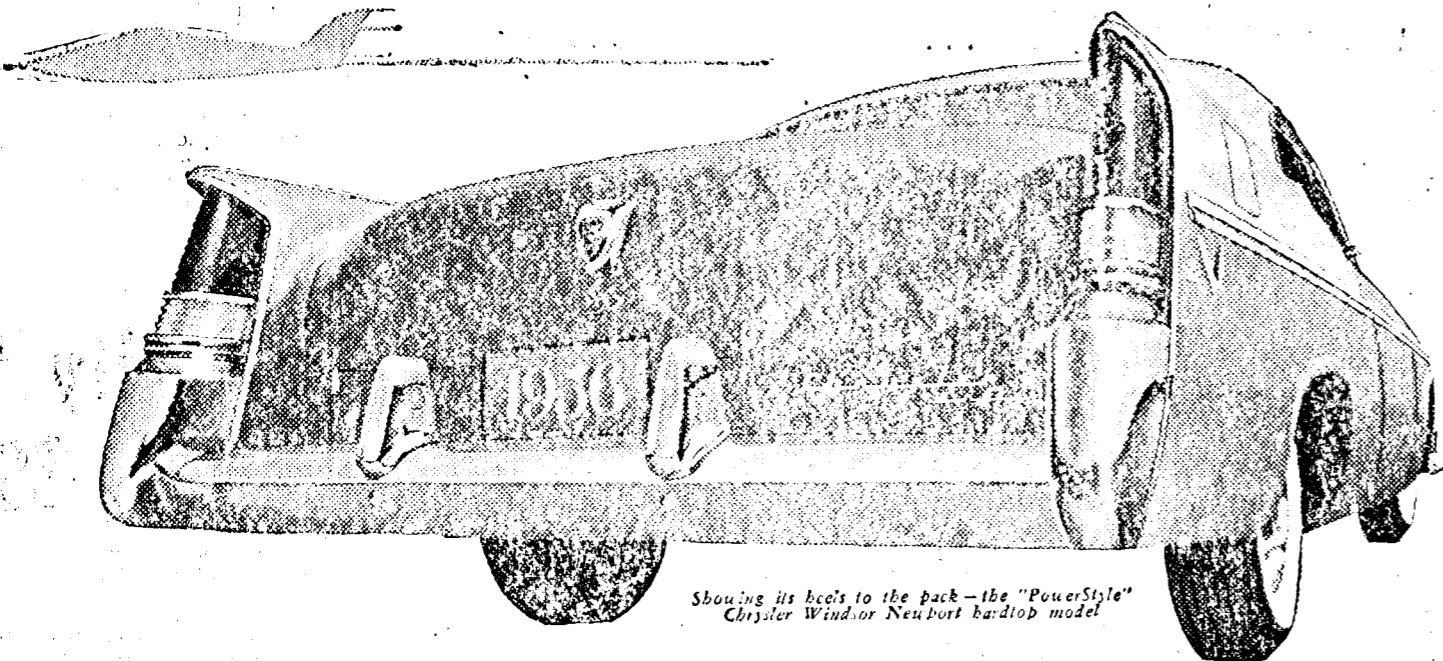

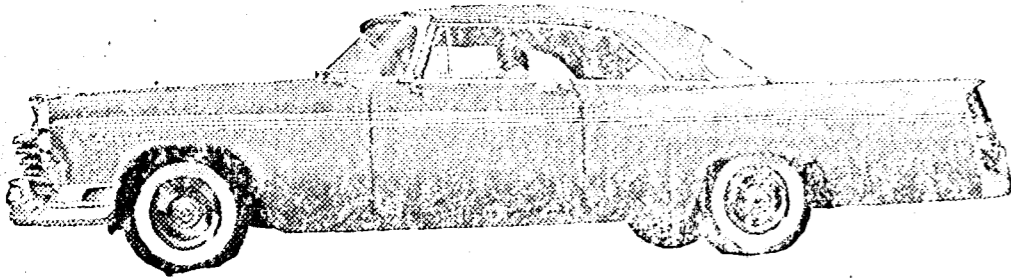

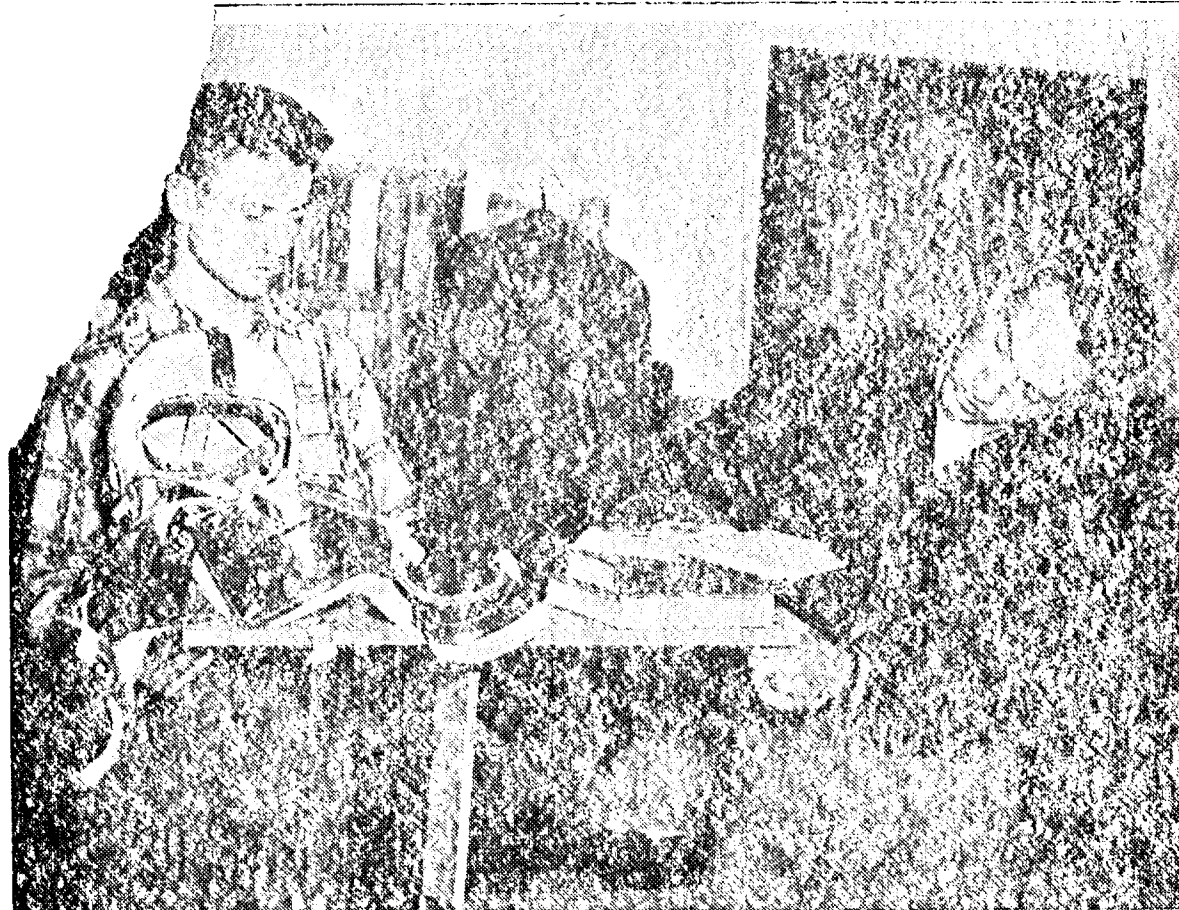
