Add tomato sauce and simmer 20 to 30 minutes. Cook spaghetti according to directions on package. Turn onto platter and pile meat balls in center. If desired, serve with cheese. YIELD: 4 to 6 servings.

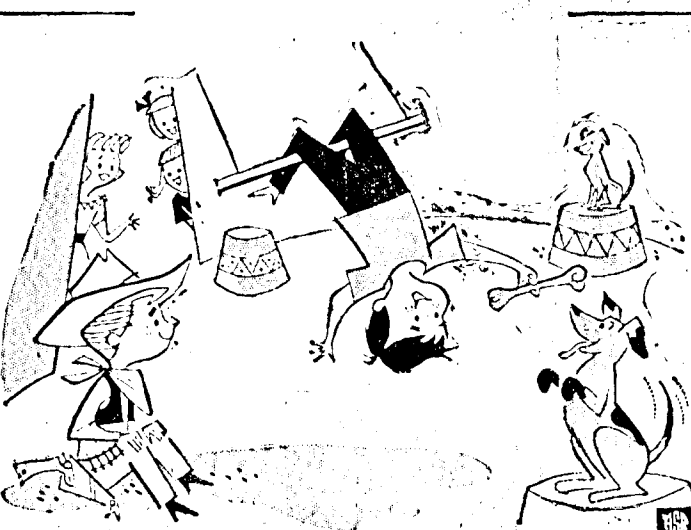
Bahensky Gets Deer with Bow and Arrow

The corn in the plot farmed by Evet Smith was sub-irrigated only. Entry was made by each farmer in the program by submitting a soil sample in the fall or winter of 1955. This year, for the first time, a nitrification rate was included in the soil test at an additional charge of 50 cents. All samples were tested by the Soil Testing Service, College of Agriculture, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Completed analyses were returned to the farmer along with recommendations by the college for the production of the yield the farmer was trying to produce.

Besides the recommendations for fertilizer requirements, a brochure of other pertinent information was prepared by the college to get comparisons made on all farms to get comparative results. Yield checks were made on fourteen plots. Eight half-damaged plots in the Arcadia area were not sampled. One dry-land plot was cut for silage and two cooperators desired no yield checks.

Yields ranged from 111 to 155 bushels on the irrigated plots. Highest yield of 155 bushels was made by Mr. J. B. Ferguson, Burwell. All yields were corrected to 15.5% moisture.

J. B. Ferguson, measured and counted ten different field locations. Row width measured in five places, averaged 38.2 inches. Average ear weight, corrected to 15.5% moisture was 559 pounds of shelled corn.

This particular plot of corn was planted with a surface planter on the 20th of May. The planter was set for a 7 1/2 inch drop. J. B. says that a hard 4 1/2 inch rain accompanied by hail just at the time the corn was coming up hurt the stand considerably. By use of the rotary as soon as field was dry enough, he was able to pull most of it through.

Although the nitrification rate indicated a need for only 40 lbs. of nitrogen, J. B. applied 70 lbs. for good measure. This was the second year for this field out of alfalfa. Forty lbs. of N were applied the first year out and 80 lbs. the second year. Mr. Ferguson believes in keeping the soil fertility level high.

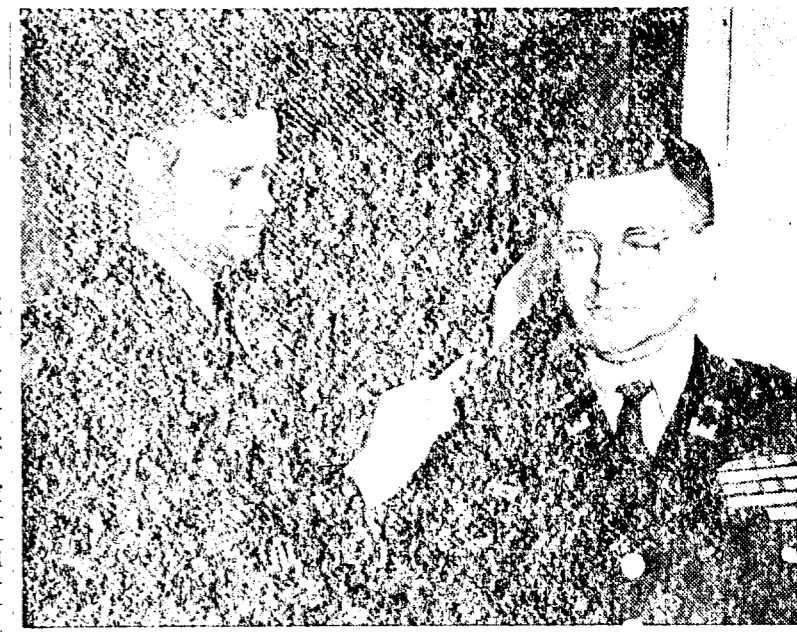
Granular aldrin was applied at planting time for corn rootworm control. Although he didn't use control for corn borer this year, J. B. says he won't let it slip by again. He figures he only needs to save 1 1/2 to 2 bushels on an acre to make corn borer control pay.

The corn was rotary hoed twice and cultivated twice. The amount of water used is not known exactly, but the corn received five irrigations.

Two of the other men entered in this program were first year irrigators. Harvey Krahulik was one of them and his yield check showed a total of 147 bushels per acre. Harvey selected for his plot a pasture that had just been broken from sod for the first time. Harvey feels that he would have gotten more corn if his hadn't suckered so badly. He attributed the suckering to moisture conditions at time of planting and also to the hybrid numbers planted.

Ray Grabowski, the other "first-year" irrigator, checked his field out at 138 bushels. Ray's soil analysis showed a low rating on nitrate so he applied 150 pounds of nitrogen. When asked what he learned from the program, Ray said that had it not been broken from sod for the first time, I don't think there's much point in putting on fertilizer until I know what the soil's actual needs are.

Ray believes that a corn plant's food needs should be in balance just like an animal's ration should be balanced. For a little experiment of his own, Ray applied four different amounts of nitrogen, 60, 80, 100, and 130 pounds were applied in strips through the field. On his particular field, Ray observed nitrogen shortage throughout the growing season on the strip that had only 60 lbs. It really showed up at picking time he said. He couldn't see much difference in the amount of corn in the wagon from the 100 and 130 lbs. strips, but there was definitely less from the strip where 80 lbs. was applied than the strip where 130 lbs. was applied. Part of the difference, Ray pointed out, was due to the difference in stand. In fact, the difference in stand was one reason why he applied only 80 lbs. Ray believes in keeping balance between number of plants, amount of fertilizer, and water too to get top yields.

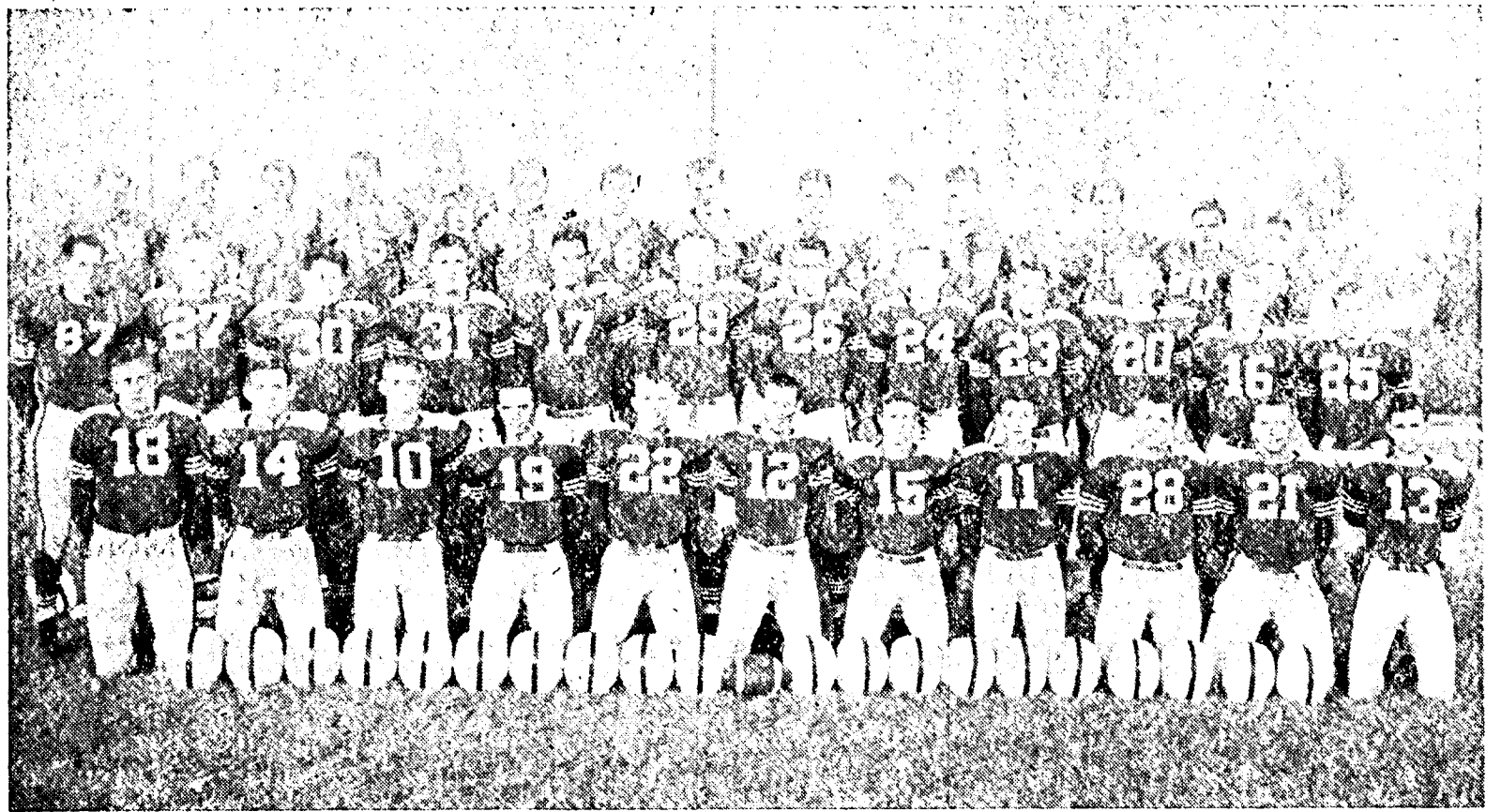

- Combine gelatine and sugar in top of double boiler. Stir in 1 cup of the cold eggnog. Place over boiling water and stir until gelatine and sugar are dissolved. Remove from heat; add remaining 1 1/2 cups eggnog. If additional flavoring is desired, add nutmeg and flavoring. Chill until slightly thicker than the consistency of unbeaten egg white. Fold in whipped cream and 1/2 cup of well-drained, diced peaches. Spoon into pastry tart shells, baked 9-inch pie shell, or into dessert dishes. Chill until firm. Decorate with remaining peach slices in poinsettia motif with finely cut maraschino cherries for flower centers.



Each year Ak-Sar-Ben grants scholarships to enough students to make up the entire student body of the average small college!

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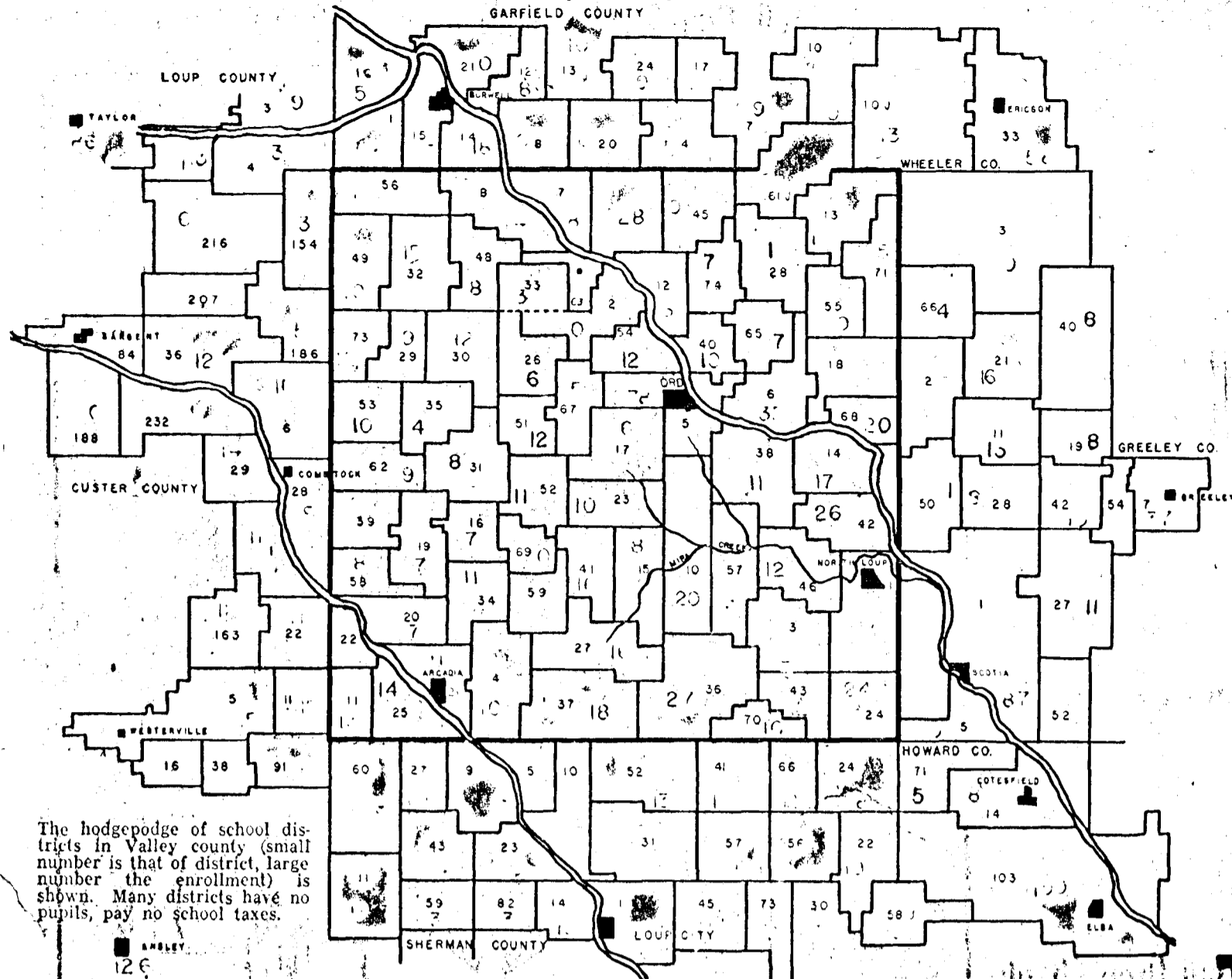
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Carson's Market -- Ord

must be provided. The means by which they can be provided will be discussed at this point. Point 1 can be achieved by reorganization so that each of the present Class I districts (commonly called rural districts) become a part of a larger district which provides the total educational program from the kindergarten through grade 12. It is possible that more than one such district could be organized within a county, or overlap into adjacent counties, but the elimination of inadequate, incomplete educational programs is a necessary step in providing modern elementary education for all children.

Point 7 will be achieved when the educational unit or district is large enough to require some differentiation of work on the part of its educators. When administrators and teachers can work in educational fields in which they have the most interest and ability, better learning will result. The above discussion indicates briefly the extent to which reorganization in Valley County can help to improve the present inadequate elementary school program which is present in most of the schools in the county. A good elementary school is in some ways easier to provide than is a good high school. As large a number of pupils is not necessary in one locality to provide a good elementary school as is necessary to provide a good high school.
