The club plans a quilting bee soon and have already completed two. They combine fun with their work each meeting.

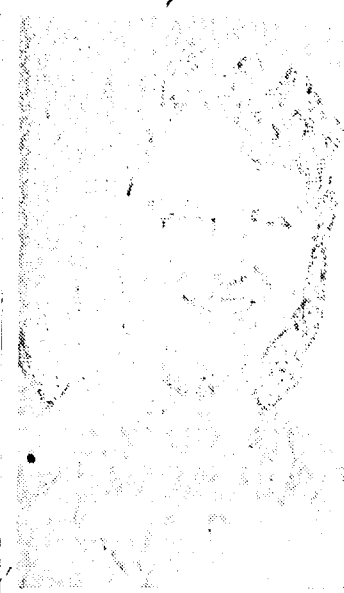
