Monday night Otto Zapp ended a five year stint on the Ord City Council when his term of office expired. Demands on his time by his job and other interests made him decide not to seek office again in the election held last November.

In a Quiz interview Tuesday Zapp recalled he wanted to know more about municipal government when he first ran for office. That was five years and three

mayors ago.

The changes he has seen since then include the establishsince then include the establishment of an independent airport authority board ("It's working out all right") the city land fill south of town started, passage of a municipal swimming pool bond issue, and soaring fuel costs for the municipal light plant. Five years ago, Zapp recalled, councilmen earned \$250 a year. Now they receive \$500 annually.

Now they receive \$500 annually. Perhaps the biggest change he has seen is the ever increasing amount of government regulation amount of government regulation involving municipal government. Many of these new strings were attached to revenue sharing funds administered through the federal government. "You can't always do what you want with tax dollars," he observed, "there are so many regulations from Washington."

council five year's ago Zapp has learned a great deal about the inner workings of municipal government. His enthusiasm for local government is undiminished. "Everyone should do it (serve on the council)" he it (serve on the council)," he said, "it is great education, and

Ord's Population Up at Year's End

Ord's population increased by nine precent according to an August 1976 population and housing survey. The report was by the Ord planning Commission and Clark Weckbach. The unofficial report listed Ord's population as 2,657. The report broke this figure down into 1,947 adults and 710 children.

This latest unofficial census figure is a gain of 218 persons, or nine percent, over the 1970 census figure of 2,439 persons. census figure of 2,439 persons.

According to the report the city has a total of 1,052 dwelling units composed of 866 houses and 145 apartments. Each residence, according to the survey, is inhabited by 2.16 persons.

Weckbach attributed the population jump to people seeking a more leisurely pace of life and the friendly small town at

the friendly small town at-

Holiday Sales Reports Mixed

Christmas sales in downtown Ord registered a mixed reaction from local merchants. Some reported sales were unchanged to down below a year ago while others reported sales up substantially from Christmas 1975.

Two of the more optimistic reports came from McDonalds Store manager Bob Moyer and Land W Tire store manager Land

Store manager Bob Moyer and L and W Tire store manager Jar-old Maxson. Maxson reported sales as being "... unreal" this year. Fast selling items including portable television sets, dish washers, microwave ovens, and trash mashers pushed his sales volums "substantially ahead of last year's sales total" in his words.

Part of the reason for the sales acceleration may have been that L and W was open only eight or nine months when Christmas 1975 rolled around. McDonald's Store Manager Bob

Moyer guesstimated November and December sales will finish 15 percent ahead of last year. The best selling items during the Christmas buying period, as listed by stone personnel were Knotts. ed by store personnel were Knotts Farm jellies, jams, and related

rarm jeines, jams, and related items.

Moyer noted there was one less week between Christmas and Thanksgiving in 1976 than there had been last year, the traditional Christmas sales period. In his estimation, this makes comparison of sales 1975-76 difficult son of sales 1975-76 difficult. C. J. Klimek, manager of Misko's Sports Center, reported sales In store owner Dean Misko's opinion, this is as it should be,

opinion, this is as it should be, because of inflation.

Klimek said good weather allowing people to go to Grand Island and low corn prices may have dampened local sales.

Henry Misko, owner of Hank's Kitchen Koop, said sales were good this year. Customers, according to Henry, were prudent in their selection of Christmas gifts. Leading sellers, according to Misko, were deep fat fryers, crepe makers, and burger machines.

He reported a slow but steady stream of customers with a fran-tic last minute rush climaxing the

Caryl Dobsen of Millie's Dress shop reported "excellent sales" during the 1976 Christmas buying season. Pantsuits and sportswear were leading sales items in the store.
Both Ord banks deposits for

Both Ord banks deposits for December were up over a year ago. A Nebraska State Bank employee listed December deposits as beeing "... real good." First National Bank President Don Blaka estimated deposits at up 11 percent above last year at this time.

Two Ord druggists estimate sales were either down or about the same as last year. One mentioned the good weather gave Ord residents opportunities to shop in nearby cities.

Before retiring Zapp told council members, "I've enjoyed working with you guys. You have done a good job in watching the taxpayers money." Zapp estimated he has served on the city council for five years.

The council approved the hiring of part-time office help for the Ord Police Department. The persons selected for the job will take phone calls, type up reports, and do other office chores. The position will be on a trial basis with the council reviewing the job sometime before next August.

Mayor Boilesen suggested the new police committee meet with him and draw up some criteria for the new position.

City Attorney L. W. Cronk submitted his resignation effective at the end of the Monday meeting. He has been city attorney for the last 21 years.

Boilesen told the council that the fuel adder tax on city light bills will be noticeable next month. Curtailment of service by Kansas - Nebraska Gas Company

Kansas - Nebraska Gas Company during December forced the city

to use diesel fuel to power municipal generators.

The city light plant has an interruptable service agreement with Kansas - Nebraska. When natural gas is needed in high priority residential sections, the light plant and others on interruptable service are given terruptable service are given

advance notice to start using an alternative fuel. In exchange for interruptable service, the city gets gas rates lower than those charged residential users.

residential users.

The council received notification from Kansas Nebraska that gas rates will be hiked 2.7 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas. The new rates are posted in the city clerk's office.

The Union Pacific Railroad, according to Boilesen, told the city they needed a one million dollar insurance policy for diesel fuel storage tanks located on the railroad right of way. The tanks in gustion are located near the

rairoad right of way. The tanks in question are located near the city light plant in east Ord

The council gave their permission for the Law and Law Enforcement Explorer Post to use the council chambers for their meeting room. The post, just being formed, will give area youths a glimpse of what a career in law enforcement is like. Those involved in the scouting program include area attorneys and law enforcement officers. Skala said he could appreciate the scouting program, but wondered just where the city should draw the line on the use of the council chambers by

outside groups.
Ord Police Chief John Young assured the council that the scouts would be well supervised.
Emil Penas, Street Commissioner outlined his one and six year plans for city street improvements. A public hearing on this matter will be held later this month.

Prices Are Up But Most Local Residents Want to Own Homes they could in previous years.

How much can Ord families in the market for new homes afford to pay for them, taking into consideration both purchase price and carrying costs?

As recently as two years ago, the American Bankers Association was adhering to the old rule of thumb that the price should not be more than two and one-half times yearly income.

one-half times yearly income.
Today, that limitation seems no
longer realistic. Because of the small amount of construction in the last few years there is not

the last few years there is not enough housing available to meet the pent up demand.

As a result, the price of homes has beeen zooming. The Federal Home Loan Bank Board reports that the average price of new homes bought with conventional mortages is now \$50,500 nationally or 34 percent more than three years ago. It ranges above and below that price in various parts of the country.

For a large part of the population, especially young couples who are at the home buying stage, that is too big a load for them to handle. In Ord many of these younger families live in the 186 apartments or mobiles homes or live in one of the 87 rented homes in the city.

In Ord, however, where in-In Ord, however, where incomes have been on the rise, many families are in a position to spend more for homes than

In general throughout the West North Central States, the cost of a home represents 3.7 years of income and in Nebraska 3.6 years.

More surprising to some housing experts is the rapid rise in the cost of used homes. They are at the record high, nationally, of \$43,000.

Added to the initial investment are the taxes, mortgage payments, and maintenance costs that have to be met. These average 20 percent of take-home pay, according to the National Association of Home Builders. The result is that more and more people are being priced out of the market.

the market.

Nevertheless most Americans are committed to the goal of home ownership. In Ord, no less than 764 of the 866 houses in the city are owned by their occupants, according to an August 1976 census by the Ord Planning Commission. Commission.
